The art of motion

turn of the century, a new art

emerged. An Italian poet, Filippo Marinetti, published a manifesto in an 1907 French newspaper, Le Figaro, which announced this new movement. Futurism.

Futurism celebrated the aesthetic beauty of movement, speed and power of modern urban and modern industrial

Instead of drawing inspiration from traditional static still lives, impressionistic landscapes, or realistic portrait paintings from the past, the Futurist drew inspiration from the dynamic machine aesthetics and other moving objects, like racing cars, planes, and trains.

Marinetti states:

"What can you find in an old picture except the painful contortions of the artist trying to break uncrossable barriers which obstruct the full expression of his dream?.... Do you want to waste the best part of your strength in a useless admiration of the past, from which you will emerge exhausted, diminished, trampled on? ... But we want no part of it, the past, we the young and strong Futurists!"

An example of a painting which focuses on motion as the subject matter is one by one of the founding fathers of the Futurist movement, Biacomo Balla's (1871-1958). The painting is Dynamism of a Dog on a Leash, 1912.

The emphasis is focused on the action of the dog, leash, and its master which is created by multiple images of scurrying feet and wagging leashes by multiple lines which overlap and blur into each other.

Though not a founding member of the Futurists, artist Marcel Duchamp (1887-1968) mastered the Futurist aesthetic with Nude Descending a Staircase No. 2, 1912.



This is one of my personal favorites: the painting depicts multiple views of an abstract nude figure walking down a staircase in what looks like a myriad of dissected angles.

According to art history text books, this was scandalous at the time as most nudes of the past depicted beautiful soft bodies just barely draped in a robe

They were very much realistic mostly lying around looking pretty, or seated quietly under a tree, waiting for time to pass. This nude is pretty ambiguous.

Is it a man, or woman? It looks like he or she is in a hurry going down the staircase.

It really did break the perceptions of what a nude should be. Most nudes didn't run down the stairs, they just sat on the ledge of a lake or laid in bed with covers half on.

The beauty of motion is captured by today's technology through the digital camera and the movie cam recorder. It's one thing to see the photographic record, but another to experience it. Roller-skating has been enjoyed around the world since 1760.

It's all about movement on wheels.

Locally, Coach Julie Jessup of Blade & Skate Roller Rink in Schererville, knows a thing or two about the art of movement. She's a former artistic roller skating champion and currently coaches a team of artistic skaters. In fact all of the members of her roller-skating club have won major awards including several first place and national titles.

Some of things coach Julie teaches her students from ages six to sixty include some of the

very things which inspired the Futurists. Artistic skating is actually art in motion which includes spins jumps, footwork, originality, poise and most important to the Futurists, speed. Some of her award winning students include Tiffany and Jeremy Jessup, Rick and Anthony Sorenson, and Ryan Jones.
